Definition

The Concise Oxford Dictionary defines values as:

- 1. The worth, desirability, or utility of a thing, or the qualities on which these depend (the value of regular exercise).
- 2. Worth as estimated; valuation (set a high value on my time).
- 3. The amount of money or goods for which a thing can be exchanged in the open market; purchasing power.
- 4. The equivalent of a thing; what represents or is represented by or may be substituted for a thing (paid them the value of their lost property).
- 5. Something well worth the money spent (cf. value-for-money).
- 6. The ability of a thing to serve a purpose or cause an effect (news value; nuisance value).
- 7. One's principles or standards; one's judgement of what is valuable or important in life
- 8. The meaning (of a word etc.); the quality (of a spoken sound).

Synonyms

Even so, they do not really seem to help. To me they only offer a guide as to what we should be looking for.



What exactly are values?

So what exactly are the values we human beings should consider?

Well I for one have thought about this conundrum and have after researching several web sites, discovered an amazing set of words that could just help me solve this conundrum

Traditional Values

The first web site that I examined was that belonging to the Traditional Values Coalition - http://www.traditionalvalues.org/defined.php. What I discovered on examining their definition of their traditional values (http://www.traditionalvalues.org/defined.php), were the following 9 major values:

- 1. Right to life
- 2. Fidelity in marriage and abstinence before marriage
- 3. The opposition to homosexual, bisexual, transgenderism, and other deviant sexual behaviours
- 4. The opposition to pornography

This web site (http://www.ccv.org/) simply stated their values as communities that are:

Values@Work

This web site (http://www.valuesatwork.org/) cross referenced the 'Hall-Tonna values inventory' to categorise and cross reference the 125. They state that 'Successful people know what their values are, and how to live them'

They provide 25 examples of these said values under 12 categories:

- 1. Play/Recreation
- 2. Being Self
- 3. Knowledge/Discovery/Insight
- 4. Empathy
- 5. Adaptability/Flexibility
- 6. Control/Order/Discipline

- 7. Human Rights/Social Order
- 8. Accountability/Ethics
- 9. The Environment
- 10. Faith/Risk/Vision
- 11. Achievement/Success
- 12. Sharing/Listening/Trust

However, they explain their organisations values as:

- 1. Purpose
- 2. Relating
- 3. Profit
- 4. Work
- 5. Simplicity/Play

The cost of their publication containing the categorised values is \$US35.



My Life Changes

This web site (http://www.mylifechanges.com) introduces a relatively economical way of tracking your personal goals and values. The cost of this service is less than \$US5 per month.
